Principles of Art: Unity

Unity is a sense of oneness in a piece of art. To create unity, all parts of the design must work together in harmony instead of competing for attention. When you walk through a neighborhood and all the houses are the same size, age, or style, the neighborhood feels unified. If one house is painted a contrasting color, it breaks the unity.

An artist can create unity in art by using:

Color: the same tint, shade, or tone

Texture: the same material or surface texture throughout the artwork

Repetition: repeating similar colors, shapes, and textures

Proximity: grouping objects together

Line: creating a guiding line that directs the eye around the piece
